


### Fall Carnival Fun!


Thank you to everyone who made this year's fall carnival a success! This fun annual event is made possible by the generous donations and many

volunteers (including students from the SERVE clubs at both Einstein and Shorewood) who ran games, served pie and pushed a broom at the end of the night.



## Important Safety Reminders

#### Parking Lot Safety

Safety comes first in the parking lot. If you are driving and picking up your child, please make sure that you allow for the traffic to flow smoothly. Please move up in the waiting line so that we don't create a traffic jam around the north end corner.

This is a message for Parents and Students! Please be good role models for each other and do *not* cross in between and/or in front of cars. Instead, please use the crosswalk near the front entrance to the school. It is monitored for everyone's safety!

#### Lining Up in the Morning

Please remind students to be safe and respectful while waiting in line by their classrooms at the beginning of each schoolday!

Parents, we truly appreciate having your extra supervision eyes to help us keep these few minutes a safe and fun experience for all students. If you see any concerns, please share these with a student patrol leader and/or a staff person immediately.

We all need to work together to ensure that students are being responsible.

#### Crossing Streets Safely

We cannot emphasize this message enough! When walking to school, safety is our top priority. Please do NOT cross over 175th with your children or at other places where there are not official school crosswalks or safety patrols.

While we recognize that it can be appealing to take this short cut, you are putting yourself and your child in danger. Every day, you are your child's most important role model.

## Attendance Reminder (or "what to do if you can't be there")

If your student will be absent for any reason, please call the MP office 206-393-4252 or email jill.gwazdauskas@shorelineschools.org to let the school know.

Please try to avoid planning events that will require your child to leave school during the day or plans that change in the middle of the day. This results in classroom interruptions that affect the learning process for all students. For example, if your child usually meets Mom at the end of the day but Grandma will be picking up, arrange to have Grandma meet the child at the usual location. We understand that emergencies occur but we ask for your cooperation in this matter.

### It's Winter Now

As the weather changes, here are some late start and school closure guidelines to keep in mind. If school is delayed (late start), we will start two hours late, at 11:10am.

AM Kindergarten will be cancelled, as will AM early childhood classes and Head Start. If we have an emergency early dismissal, there will be not extended day after-care.

#### New Science Curriculum

This year, our district begins a science materials adoption cycle for grades K–6. A team of Shoreline teachers worked together this fall to develop a draft of science "power standards" and will be sharing these with each elementary school.

## Roots of Empathy

Two very young citizens have recently joined the Meridian Park community. Felix and Elyse are infants who—with their mothers—are volunteering in the Roots of Empathy (ROE) Program. ROE is an evidence-based classroom program that is effective in reducing aggression and violence among school children, while also increasing empathy along with social and emotional competence.

Erin Dragovich, who works at the Shoreline Children's Center, and MP Family Advocate Annie Gage, attended three days of training to become qualified as ROE instructors. They are working in the classrooms of Mary Loes and Diana Kushner.

Central to ROE are monthly visits by and infant and his or her parent to a K-8 classroom. During these visits—facilitated by an ROE instructor—students observe, predict and ask questions about human development, infant safety and temperament. Sessions with their ROE instructor precede and follow the family visits and reinforce the fostering of empathy and emotional literacy. ### Composting at Meridian Park

## Friendship, Families and Feelings

Fortunately, Meridian Park is a school in which bullying is not usually a serious problem. However, for the child who gets bullied, or for the parent of that child, it is a very seriously problem, which we take seriously. Our efforts at bullying prevention are multifaceted; assemblies, classroom discussions with teachers, meetings with Mrs. Jessee, and I teach the Second Step bullying prevention curriculum in many classrooms.

Hallmarks of bullying are that it is one-sided, aggressive, intentional, can be physical or mental, and that it's intent is to gain power. Kids seem to understand that it doesn't have to involve physical contact, but it can be confusing to know, when their feelings get hurt, if that was bullying or just someone being mean, or even having a misunderstanding.

As a staff, we tell kids to try to solve a problem themselves the first time, and if it continues, to get help from an adult.

Lately, I've been sharing the following questions with 4th and 5th graders so they can think about their own behavior.

Although this list comes from *A Smart Girl's Guide to Friendship Troubles* published by American Girl, I believe it is equally applicable to boys!

- Do you need to be in charge all the time—and hate it when you're not?
- Does hardly a day go by when you don't criticize somebody?
- Do you get mad at others when they don't do as you say?
- Do you make social "rules" for others to follow and make threats when they don't?
- Are people afraid of how you are going to react?
- Have you made insulting remarks to people about things you know they can't do anything about?
- Do you feel people should work to win your approval?
- Do you think it's okay to say mean things to people?
- Do you decide who's in and who's out of your group?

I tell students that if they answer "yes" to any of these questions, they need to stop. It can also help to talk to a trusted adult and get support to change their behavior.

Each year more than 150,000 students from USA, Canada and many other parts of the world take the AMC 8.
