

Principal's Letter

February is finally here and we are about halfway through the school year! It truly amazes me how quickly the school year goes by. Thank you for attending your child's conference week. It was a great opportunity for us to connect with families and to share academic updates. If you missed your child's conference, please know that we still want to meet with you. Please call or e-mail your child's teacher to set this up. It is so important to stay connected to school life and we learn so much from our parents every time we meet.

February is an exciting month filled with lots of events around Meridian Park. We kicked the month off with a fun Fitness Night and a fabulous Circus Arts / JUMP Team performance on last Tuesday. For our intermediate students, we also had an engaging two days of YADA workshops (Youth Awareness Disability Assemblies). Our students learned about various abilities and disabilities through experiential learning and real-life connections with adults living with differing abilities. For example, they moved through five different stations where they experienced hands-on what it would be like to live with vision issues, have a learning disability, and need to use a wheelchair and/or service dogs. The students loved this experience and we held lots of classroom discussions about care and empathy following this experience.

Our mathletes and our musicians have been busy this month. Students in our PTSA math club celebrated some great honors at their latest math competition and some of our MP students participated in the west side band concert at Shorewood High School. Our PTSA Drama Club just began rehearsing for their *Willy Wonka* production and we are very excited to see the final performances during the last week of March. Lastly, our MP/PTSA Read-a-thon will kick off with a fun assembly on February 28 with Alex Zerbe and follow-up with an author's visit from Barry Deutsch.

On a more serious note, with the recent events of Sandy Hook, our own recent neighborhood lockdown, and other school tragedies around the nation, we are continually reminded of the importance of safety. We are also reminded about how grateful we are to you for trusting us with the care of your children. As many of you know, our school district has safety protocols and procedures in place and our district safety coordinator has reviewed them with each school staff in Shoreline. We have links on our Web site to some of the most common emergency drills such as lockdown, lockout, earthquake and fire drill. Protocol for Lockouts & Lockdowns

Information about the Shoreline School District Staff Protocol for Lockouts and Lockdown Situations:

Lockout Response Actions

For EXTERNAL threat or Hazard outside school building When the following announcement is repeated:

"Lockout, secure the Perimeter." "Lockout, secure the Perimeter." Teachers:

- Quickly get students and staff into the building and lock all exterior doors
- Recover students and staff from outside of building.
- Lock your classroom doors.
- Close classroom exterior blinds (if you have them).
- Take roll, account for students, staff and adults.
- Email attendance to Front Office.
- Increased situational awareness. Do business as usual.

Lockout Response Actions

For INTERNAL threat or Hazard inside school building

- When threat exists, can be initiated by ANY Teacher or Staff Member;
 Call 9-9-1-1 ... have last known location & description of intruder(s).
- Call School Office; have last know location, description of intruder(s).

When you hear the following announcement repeated: "Lockdown...Locks, Lights, Out of Sight." "Lockdown...Locks, Lights, Out of Sight."

Teachers.

- Quickly get students and staff into the NEAREST ROOM WITH LOCKING DOORS.
- · Lock classroom door.
- Lights out.
- Move away from sight.
- · Maintain silence.
- Take roll, account for students, staff and adults.
- Email attendance to Front Office.
- Place GREEN CARD (if room is safe) under door and in exterior window (if you have one).
- Place RED CARD (something is wrong) under door and in exterior window (if you have one).
- Wait for First Responders to open door.

Sixth-Grade Math Team Qualifies for the MATHCOUNTS State Contest

Jamie Forschmiedt, Chris Lawson, Maria Babcock, Evelynn Li, and Kevin Lee competed in the MATHCOUNTS Seattle chapter competition on February 2 at the University of Washington.

MATHCOUNTS, a national competition for middle schools, takes place in four stages. The first stage was the school-level contest. Ten mathletes move on to the chapter-level contest, four representing the school as team and the others competing as individuals. The chapter-level contest takes place between the schools that are in the geographical regions of the chapters of the Washington Society of Professional Engineers. Jamie (19th) and Chris (24th) made the list of top 25% individuals in the Seattle chapter.

Meridian Park earned seventh place behind Lakeside MS (one of last year's MP students was on this team), Hamilton International MS, Albert Einstein MS (consisting of four of last year's MP students), The Evergreen School, University Prep, and Seattle Country Day School. Meridian Park was one of two elementary school teams competing in a field of 16 teams. The team of Jamie Forschmiedt, Chris Lawson, Evelynn Li, and Kevin Lee advanced to the state-level competition at Microsoft on March 16, joining the qualifying teams from the eight chapters. As a sixth-grade team going against the top middle school teams from around the state, we will use this opportunity to practice for the next two years and will be working towards realistic goals at the State Competition this year.

Kindergarten Art Classes

Teaching artists Cheri Micheletti and Esta Modian worked with the kindergarten classes to create illustrations of a snail in a garden, inspired by the book *The Snail's Spell*. Students learned about the art element of line, and used curved, straight, and zigzag lines to draw their scenes.

Families, Friends, and Feelings

notes from Annie Gage, Meridian Park Family Advocate

Stressors that families face can often leave children feeling lonely and different from their peers. Going to a camp with others who have had similar experiences can be fun, educational, and decrease isolation. The following two camps offer such opportunities.

Camp Mariposa

This is an overnight camp for children who have been affected by the drug or alcohol abuse or addiction of a family member. It is presented by Youth Eastside Services and The Moyer Foundation. It lasts two days, is free of cost, and is offered throughout the school year.

The camp offers traditional fun camp activities enhanced with therapeutic elements to increase campers' understanding of the impact of substance abuse on the family and reduce their sense of isolation. Camp is staffed by professional counselors. For more information, contact Youth Eastside Services at 425-747-4937.

Camp Erin: A Grief Support Camp for Kids & Teens This three-day overnight camp for is for kids and teens, ages 6–17, who have experienced the death of a loved one. Facilitated by professional staff and trained volunteers, it is offered free of charge to kids and teens throughout King County.

Participants at Camp Erin get to be around other kids who have experienced similar losses. They have opportunities to enjoy typical camp activities as well as those designed to help them understand and process their grief. This year's Camp Erin will be held August 23–25 in Carnation. Cheetah CHAMPS Recruitment Night

Cheetah CHAMPS, the new parent volunteer program, started off with fun and flair. A daring bunch of parents were our very first CHAMPS during the early weeks of January. At our January 17 kick-off event, they marveled at Louis Foxx's magic before describing their experiences as CHAMPS. Afterward, twenty more parents, and even a couple of grandparents, signed up as CHAMPS for this school year.



On January 24, MP Parent Jill Steinberg was our CHAMP. She describes her day:

A Cheetah CHAMP's Perspective, by Jill Steinberg "Whose mom are you?" was the most frequently asked question of me today, a first-time Cheetah CHAMP.

My day started out with "first day of school" butterflies, not knowing what to expect. The jam-packed schedule had me assigned to volunteer in three classrooms in the morning, three lunch/recess periods, two classrooms in the afternoon plus more afternoon recess. The day began with a visit to my daughter's classroom where I was able to assist a few students with the math problem of the day. The time passed very quickly and I was off to the next classroom to help the teacher grade papers. The third classroom's students were working on a unique project and the teacher had me walk around and ask the students questions about what they were working on. Next up, recess!

I played tag with some K-2 students and watched several impressive stunts on the monkey bars. During 3-4 recess I learned that what I called the "vomit wheel" during my childhood is pleasantly called the "Tormato" at Meridian Park (the big red wheel that the kids spin around on). I joined my daughter and her class for lunch, swapping stories about the day and exchanging a dessert or two. After eating, I roamed around the lunchroom and chatted with a few students I hadn't met before. At one table sat a group of boys who were collectively from Albania, Mexico, Eritrea, and the United States. It reminded me how lucky we are to have such a wonderfully rich and diverse student body at Meridian Park!

My afternoon was filled with 30 minutes in the ELL classroom helping students with their poster projects and heading outside for more recess.

I am so glad that I volunteered as a Cheetah CHAMP! I ended the day meeting at least four new teachers, getting to spend time with our amazing recess and lunch room mavens, and engaging (and assisting) countless students. We are so lucky to have this program at Meridian Park and I highly recommend it if you are looking to take part in your student's day along with experiencing many of the people who make Meridian Park the special place that it is.

about working with their team and schedule so the kids can be at the concert, and we all know that parents can move mountains in order to attend. You won't want to miss it!



Shoreline Public Schools Foundation Announces 2012–13 Classroom Grants

Last month, the Shoreline Public Schools Foundation awarded 39 Classroom Grants totaling more than \$28,000 to elementary, middle, and high school classrooms throughout the Shoreline District.

Meridian Park teacher Pamela Willoughby applied for and was awarded a \$1,750 Creative Ballet "Phase 2" grant that will allow her to continue her partnership with artists Tim and Alex Lynch of the Seattle Dance Project, teaching creative ballet to all K–6 students. The project will culminate in an evening performance for the community in the spring.

Classroom Grants fund innovative teaching such as specialized science instruction and field trips, arts programs, new books for all grade levels and interests, and other programs that enhance student learning. Classroom Grants are one of the many ways SPSF supports Shoreline students, and every school in the district is invited to submit proposals.

Since 1992, the Shoreline Public Schools Foundation has provided more than \$2.9 million in funding for enrichment and teaching beyond the basic curriculum in all K-12 Shoreline schools, as well as helping to fund basic educational needs when called upon.

The generous response of Shoreline and LFP residents to the foundation's November 4 "Calling for Kids" Phonathon demonstrates the support the community gives to help make the Shoreline Public Schools District one of the top-rated districts in the state.
