WASHINGTON STATE CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP

Arjun Thomas, Logan Gnanapragasam, and Julien Goldstick participated in the Washington State Elementary Chess Championships at Smith Cove Cruise Terminal Events Center in Seattle on April 12th. Arjun scored 4.5 points out of 5 and earned first place among 111 sixth graders to become a State Elementary Chess Champion. Logan scored 3.0 points (52nd place) in the sixth-grade section, and Julien scored 3.0 point (59th place) in the 197 player fifth-grade section, giving Meridian Park a score of 10.5 in the 4-6 section.

The team score is the sum of the scores of the top four players from the school in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade events. Unfortunately, this was not enough to earn Meridian Park a team trophy--the absence of the fourth player was too much of a penalty for them to overcome. These three qualified to participate in the Washington State Elementary Chess Championships by playing in scholastic chess tournaments and earning at least three points in one of those tournaments. Students in grades 3 – 6 are involved in state MSP assessments this month. It's an important opportunity for students to demonstrate their progress in meeting state standards. On-time attendance is very important. Thank you for supporting your student with positive encouragement, a good breakfast, and consistent routines. Go Cheetahs! (This is the final year of the current state assessment before the national common core assessment begins in the spring of 2015.)

Classrooms and teams will be very busy during May and June with culminating learning activities, field trips, celebrations, and other activities. Sometimes fees are needed, but please let your teacher know if you need financial assistance, as we DO have resources for scholarships and we want to support all families. We appreciate your involvement and support in our activities.

SOME THOUGHTS ABOUT BFFS

Before the 1980s (Wikipedia dates the term to no later than 1987), children had friends. Maybe they had best friends. But no one had a BFF because the phrase hadn't been invented yet!

BFF- Best Friends Forever. Such a lovely notion. So rare in real life.

I don't know how the phrase started, but sometimes I wish I could stop it! It seems like a marketing tool that does not nurture the children it pretends to celebrate.

Certainly, some children make friendships in elementary school that last a lifetime. (I just reconnected with someone after finding a photograph of myself all dressed up for her 5th birthday party. We'll probably stay in touch now, but there were 35 years during which we had no contact.)

Having a BFF shouldn't be the goal of childhood friendships. Childhood is a time for children to learn as much as they can about how to have fun with peers while learning how to negotiate, take turns, assert themselves, be kind, generous, trusting and trustworthy, and discover what they like and don't like in friendships.

Due to temperament traits, some children will naturally gravitate to having a small number of friends or to having just one very close friend. Others will tend to have a number of friends and may rarely or never have a "best" friend. Neither of these styles is better than the other.

What concerns me about the BFF concept is that sometimes children get caught up in that label yet without attending to what's required for care and feeding of healthy friendship, such as respect and kindness.

Another behavior I've sometimes seen in the name of "BFF" is that it's used as a means to of control: "If you're my BFF, you'll do such and such..." or "Because we're BFFs, you should..." This completely overlooks the fact that healthy friendships are about equal weight being give to the wishes and needs of both parties.

Let's all keep coaching children to have healthy, well-rounded friendships in whatever quantity suits them best. We can encourage them to enjoy friendship in all its many forms, not only the kind that rises to the top and lasts for years.

END-OF-THE-YEAR LIBRARY BOOK ROUND-UP

The school year is winding down quickly. In order to complete an inventory of all library books, they will need to be turned in before the last week of school. Below is a schedule to help students return their books:

By Tuesday, May 27^{th} , all students must have no more than two library books checked out. By Monday, June 2^{nd} , all students must have no more than one library book checked out. By Tuesday, June 10^{th} , all students must have all library books returned to the library.

Students who still have books on their library records after June 10th will take home letters to share with parents, letting them know about the overdue books. If a book cannot be found, a student can either purchase a replacement copy with the same binding and cover, or pay for the book.

Students will not receive their report cards on the last day of school, June 20th, if they haven't taken care of their overdue and lost books. Report cards will be held in the front office until students find, replace, or pay for books.

Please help your children look for library books at home, as well as in vehicles. Thanks for your support with this.


