

Principal's Letter

Dear Meridian Park Families,

We are in full swing at Meridian Park! Thanks for such a wonderful start to the new school year. Classrooms are buzzing with activities, field trips have begun, our PTSA fundraiser is gearing up and we are truly off to a great start! Thank you for your support of our school Walk-a-thon—we are still accepting donations if you have not already contributed to this Student Council fundraiser. We greatly appreciate it!

Since the start of school, we have added a few more staff to our community. Please join me in welcoming Trilby Cohen as the .5 teacher in Mr. Lockwood's third grade classroom and James Lakey as our new Head Night Custodian. Liz Bentley, our half-day Kindergarten teacher will also take on additional teaching duties as a .2 teacher in Ms. Woodward's 2/3 classroom each afternoon. We will also be hiring soon for a .4 teaching position in Ms. Quezada's 5th grade classroom. Lastly, during the next few weeks, we will say goodbye to a dearly beloved member of our school community. Roxie Brendible, our fabulous office manager for 12 years at Meridian Park, has been recruited to our central office and will take the position of Career and Technical Education Specialist. I can speak for all of us when I say that we will miss her tremendously here at Meridian Park. Personally, I have felt so fortunate to have such a wonderful, dedicated and extremely skilled person working besides me in the office for my entire time as Principal. She will always be a special part of the Meridian Park community and will be sorely missed.

Over the past three weeks, our teachers have worked hard assessing all of our students at each grade level in math and reading. At conferences, you may hear the acronyms DIBELS, easyCBM, SRI or CORE. These are some of the many words for our district screening tools/ assessment measures that we use to

help us know where students are academically in relation to their peers. These results guide our daily instruction and intervention planning for our students along the way. It has been a lot of work but very worthwhile!

On the October 5 non-student day, our K-6 teachers were busy learning our new science curriculum. This fall, our staff will also work together to reflect on student progress from last year as well as the results from our spring 2012 state assessment, the MSP (Measure of Student Progress). These results are posted on our District Web site as well as the OSPI (Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction) Web site. We did very well but we still have more work to do to ensure that every student reaches or exceeds standard. Each year, we write our school goals centered on the improvement of our students' academic achievement in math and reading. For our reading focus, we are excited to begin our primary grades reading block program and to continue our Comprehension Toolkit program alignment in K-6. For math, our teachers are excited to dig deeper in their use of the Envision Math Program and become even more intentional about looking more deeply and frequently at students' math progress on benchmark tests and unit tests. It is exciting and important work.

As we head into October, I look forward to seeing many of you during conference week and at the fun Fall Carnival on October 26. Thank you for all of your help with this new school year. We appreciate the time and energy you give to your child at school and at home. We couldn't do our jobs without your support.

Here's to a fabulous fall!

What's Cookin'?

Fresh From the Shoreline Central Kitchen

It has been a busy summer for Kathy Walker, Food and Nutrition Services Manager for the Shoreline School District, and her team. They have been working extra hard to reformulate and create new recipes to comply with the new USDA school nutrition guidelines. All of the new regulations mean good news for Shoreline students! They will see an increase in the availability of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains while sodium and saturated fats will be reduced. There are also now per-lunch minimum and maximum calorie counts:

K-6 grades = 550-650 calories (formerly 650 minimum) 7-8 grades = 600-700 (formerly 750 minimum) 9-12 grades = 750-850 (formerly 850 minimum)

Because of new USDA regulations, the district's meal planning has switched from Nutrient-Based Menu Planning to Food-Based Menu Planning. This means that although calories, fat, and nutrients are still important to keep track of, we want students to focus on what foods they are putting into their bodies, such as fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and teaching them about the components of a healthy meal. The new guidelines require that five components be available to students at lunch and that they must take three, including at least one vegetable and/or fruit. During the first week of school, members of the district's Healthy Lifestyles Committee volunteered at school cafeterias during lunch to help the students understand this change.

Because of the change in guidelines, students will no longer be able to purchase two servings of pizza, hot dogs, fish nuggets, beef and bean nachos, or shrimp poppers. There will be at least four other side items available to enjoy with each entree, so hungry students will have plenty of options to choose from. Students will be able to continue buying two servings of items such as corn dogs, fiesta chicken burrito, chicken teriyaki and rice, veggie chili, veggie lasagna, and bean-and-cheese burrito.

Exciting things are planned for fall! Last year, Lake Forest Park piloted a salad bar for a month and it was a huge success! In October, salad bars will be launching in elementary schools and more variety will be added to existing salad bars in other schools. Some of the additions include spinach, cauliflower, garbanzo beans, cottage cheese, red pepper, red onion, and another dressing option. More foods are being made from scratch, so stay

tuned for a taste test of Italian meat sauce with whole-wheat penne coming to an elementary school near you!

Desserts have almost disappeared from the menu but Kathy and her team are beginning to rework recipes for Pirate Cake and the beloved chocolate cake so that they contain more whole grains. To meet the new standards, Shoreline's bread items must be 50% whole grain rich and next year contain 100% whole grain. Kathy is ahead of schedule as items currently on the menu plan where whole grain is a main ingredient contain 75% whole grain.

The Food and Nutrition Department is excited for these changes and looks forward to the challenges of complying with the new guidelines. Please feel free to call Kathy for more information at 206-393-4207 and if you have time, please join your child for lunch one day and let us know what you think about these changes.

Let's Make Birthdays Happy for Everyone

This is a friendly reminder to have a birthday party etiquette chat with your children. I have often observed kids talk about a birthday party they are having, or were invited to, in front of children who were not invited.

That experience was no fun for the non-invited back in the '60s when I was in elementary school. Many things have changed since then, but hurt feelings at being left out aren't one of them. Teaching kids to be tactful about this wonderful childhood tradition is a simple step toward keeping the school environment friendly and inclusive.

This is all your children need to know to help keep the "happy" in Happy Birthday:

Invite guests by phone, computer, or snail-mail: Do not send invitations via your child at school. Along with the potential for hurt feelings when you do, party invitations are just too exciting and potentially disruptive to the learning environment.

Guide your child to keep all birthday party conversations off school grounds unless they are inviting everyone involved in the conversation.

Babies on Board!

Last year, Meridian Park piloted Roots of Empathy (ROE) in our two 1st grade classrooms. ROE is an evidence-based program that has shown a dramatic effect in reducing levels of aggression among school children while raising social and emotional competence and increasing empathy.

At the heart of the program are an infant and parent who visit a classroom nine times over the school year.

This year, Meridian Park has five young "teachers" joining us through ROE in three 3rd grade classrooms and two 1st grade classrooms. Joining me as instructors are Erin Dragovich and Meridian Park parent Karli Larson.

What's Happening in PE?

We have just finished soccer skills, and are working on tossing and catching in soft lacrosse. We will revisit soccer later in the year.
